

<b>Access to Care Adult Day Program, Assisted Living and Supportive Housing Definitions</b>	
<b>Adult Day Programs</b>	Planned social and recreational activities, meals, assistance with the activities of daily living and minor health care assistance; e.g. monitoring essential medications. These activities are provided in a congregate setting, provide respite care to caregivers and is likely to be <b>one of a basket of services that the client is receiving.</b>
<b>Assisted Living</b>	<p>Services that support people with special needs who require services at a greater frequency or intensity than home care but without the medical monitoring or supervision that would be provided in a long-term care home. Services can be provided “on demand” as clients require, (e.g: in response to issues related to incontinence).</p> <p>Historically, Assisted Living services have been provided to people living in <b>Supportive Housing.</b></p> <p>The <b>Assisted Living for High Risk Seniors Policy (ALS-HRS)</b> was designed to decouple Assisted Living from Supportive Housing to allow Assisted Living services to be provided to people living in neighborhood clusters</p>
<b>Supportive Housing</b>	Buildings, (apartment or town house- like construction). Often, these buildings are the responsibility of municipalities and rents are subsidized
